## How you can help your child learn English

It can be quite challenging for many students to find themselves in an English speaking school, especially if they don't speak the language very well. At Oxford Spires Academy we work very hard to help your child adapt to the new situation. Here are some things you can do at home to support them with the transition, and then during the year.

- Make sure your child has a bilingual dictionary to use both at home and at school.
- Encourage them to attend EAL homework club.
- Encourage them to read widely in both languages.
- It is very important that they maintain high command of their mother tongue as this helps with academic skills.
- Ask them to read in their mother tongue about a subject they are studying, and to keep a vocabulary log.
- The new situation is even more difficult for students who were successful back in their countries. Let your child know you are aware of the challenges of learning the curriculum through a foreign language. Don't expect too much too soon.
